This bipartisan measure reauthorizes the 50-year-old **Elementary and Secondary Education** Act (ESEA), the nation's national education law and longstanding commitment to equal opportunity for all students.



Some Highlights of Every Student Succeeds Act

ESSA includes provisions that will help to ensure success for students and schools. Below are just a few.

The law:

- Advances equity by upholding critical protections for America's disadvantaged and high-need students.
- Requires—for the first time—that all students in America be taught to high academic standards that will prepare them to succeed in college and careers.
- Ensures that vital information is provided to educators, families, students, and communities through annual statewide assessments that measure students' progress toward those high standards.
- Helps to support and grow local innovations—including evidence-based and placebased interventions developed by local leaders and educators—consistent with our Investing in Innovation and Promise Neighborhoods
- Sustains and expands this administration's historic investments in increasing access to high-quality preschool.
- Maintains an expectation that there will be accountability and action to effect positive change in our lowest-performing schools, where groups of students are not making progress, and where graduation rates are low over extended periods of time.



Purpose of Title I

Title I serves to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic achievement standards and state academic assessments.



Title I Eligibility

Children eligible for free and/or reduced lunches under the National School Lunch Act.



Some children are deemed automatically eligible to participate:

- A. Any student served in the Migrant Education Program;
- B. Any child who participated in Head Start, Even Start, the Early Reading First program, or Title I preschool services at any time within the previous two years;
- C. Any child attending a community day program or living in a state or local institution for neglected or delinquent children; and
- D. Any child who is homeless and attending any school in the LEA.

School-wide Title I

- Aims to improve the entire educational program in a school.
- 62 of our schools are School-wide Title I programs
- Considerations still must be made on which students/areas are critical in terms of being at-risk.





- Additional monitoring of these staff members will come from the Office of Federal Programs to ensure compliance.

• Title I is the nation's oldest and largest federally funded program, according to the U.S. Department of Education.







Complaints Procedure

Clayton County Public Schools - Complaint Procedures under the Every Student Succeeds Act

Any individual, organization, or agency ("complainant") may file a complaint with Clayton County Public Schools (CCPS) if that individual, organization, or agency believes and alleges that CCPS is violating a Federal statute or regulation that applies to a program under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). The complaint must allege a violation that occurred not more than one (1) year prior to the date the complaint is received, unless a longer period is reasonable because the violation is considered systemic or ongoing.
